about ARIN

what is ARIN?

ARIN is a nonprofit, member-based organization whose primary role is managing the distribution of Internet number resources (IPv4 and IPv6 addresses and Autonomous System Numbers [ASNs]) to entities within its service region. Established in December 1997 in Chantilly, Virginia, ARIN is one of five Regional Internet Registries (RIRs) that not only ensure the uniqueness of IP addresses and ASNs but also support the operation and growth of the Internet through technical coordination, collaboration, and the promotion of the participatory policy development model. ARIN, as a responsible steward of Internet number resources within its region, contributes to sustainable Internet development by ensuring the transparency of the distribution process, the accuracy of registration data, and the openness of the community-driven policy development process.

services offered

Registration Services

ARIN's primary function is the allocation and transfer of Internet number resources, but ARIN also maintains database records, reverse delegation registration (also known as reverse Domain Name System [DNS]), and help desk and customer support services.

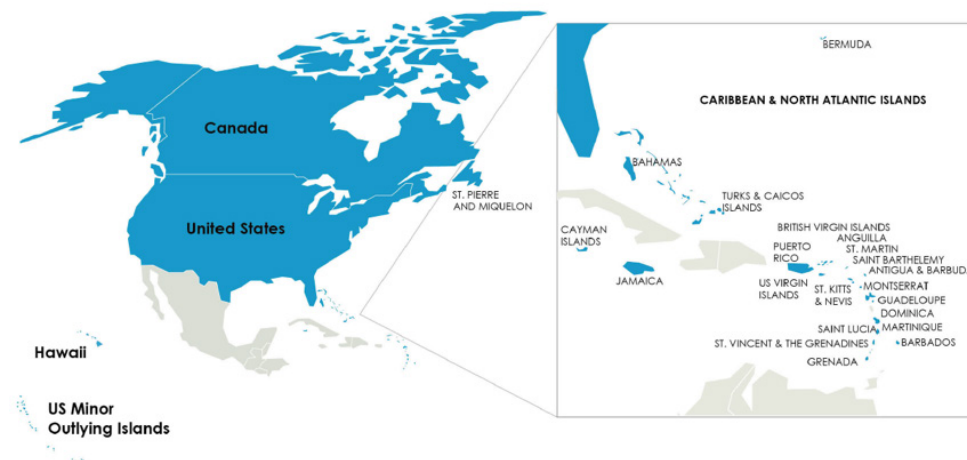
Technical Services

ARIN develops, implements, and supports both internal systems and community services like ARIN Online, Registration Data Access Protocol (RDAP), the Internet Routing Registry (IRR), and Resource Public Key Infrastructure (RPKI).

Organization Services

ARIN coordinates meaningful interaction between members, stakeholders, and the organization through the facilitation of an inclusive policy development process, information services and mailing lists, outreach and education, and community engagement.

the ARIN region



The ARIN region includes Canada, 25+ Caribbean and North Atlantic countries, Antarctica, and the United States and minor outlying areas.

ARIN currently serves approximately **40,000** organizations and manages roughly **8 million** registration records, including both public Whois records and internal database records.

from the president and board

To the ARIN community,

As we look back on 2025, we want to take a moment to reflect on a year of technical evolution and community engagement. With the dedication of our community, volunteers, and staff, we have continued to safeguard the stability and security of the Internet's number resource system.

Our collective achievements this year highlight ARIN's commitment to service excellence and robust Internet governance. Some key milestones in 2025 included:

Advancing Technical Excellence

We took several major steps to modernize our infrastructure and enhance security across our services. Early in the year, we transitioned to supporting only TLS 1.2 and 1.3 to ensure high standards of cryptographical security. We retired FTP protocol access and the OriginAS field from the ARIN database as part of our effort to reduce technical debt and focus on improvements to our core services. ARIN's Engineering team completed a multiyear effort to move systems to a new data center, which helps increase reliability for our services.

Several improvements were made to our

Resource Public Key Infrastructure (RPKI) in 2025, including: the Internet Routing Registry (IRR) Auto-Manager, which allows customers to automatically create IRR route objects based on an existing Route Origin Authorization (ROA); the addition of Autonomous System Provider Authorizations (ASPAs) to ARIN's Operational Test & Evaluation environment; and our ROA Change Log, which displays a list of new and modified ROAs of an organization in ARIN Online.

Governance and Community Engagement

Through multiple rounds of global community consultation on the proposed "RIR Governance Document," the Address Supporting Organization Address Council, along with support from ARIN and our fellow Regional Internet Registries, worked transparently to strengthen and update the framework that supports our global mission.

Expanded Education and Outreach

This year, we launched ARIN Academy, an e-learning platform that features interactive, self-paced courses on IPv6 planning, using ARIN Online, and RPKI. We plan to release additional courses in the coming years,

and we hope our members find this to be a valuable resource.

Throughout the year, we attended many Internet community events and hosted multiple ARIN on the Road workshops throughout our region. We also hosted our inaugural ARIN Deep Dive technical workshop, an in-person event focused on optimizing customers' utilization of our routing security services.

Our Commitment to You

Our commitment to the Internet community remains the driving force behind every initiative we undertake. We are dedicated to providing stable and secure management of Internet number resources with our newly adopted strategic priorities that focus on four key pillars: **Global Leadership, Governance and Organizational Resilience, Member Experience and Advocacy, and Operational and Technical Excellence.** We value the trust you place in us and remain steadfast in our commitment to our mission.

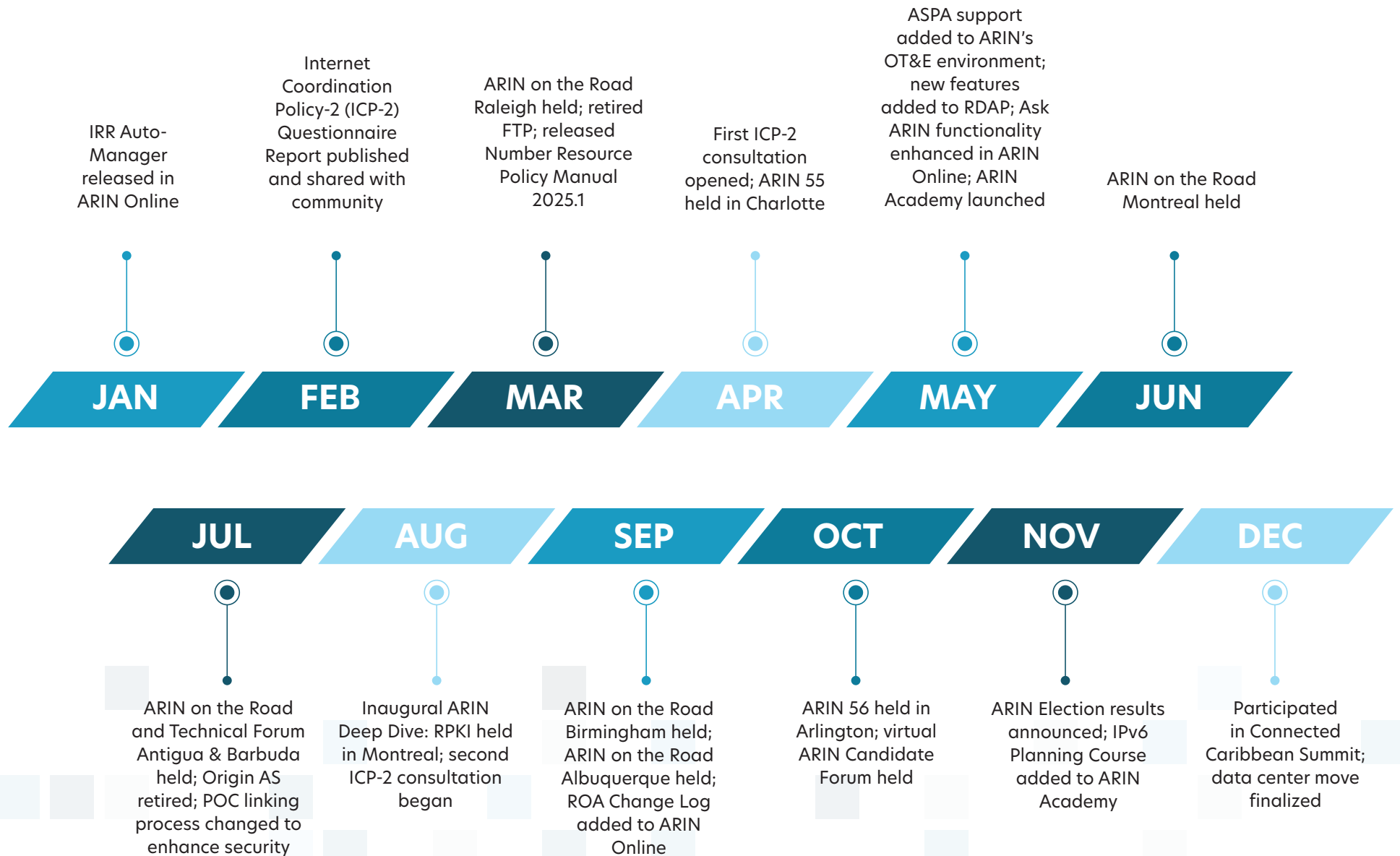

Membership is not a requirement for attaining direct Internet number resources from ARIN, nor does it offer any advantage in doing so.

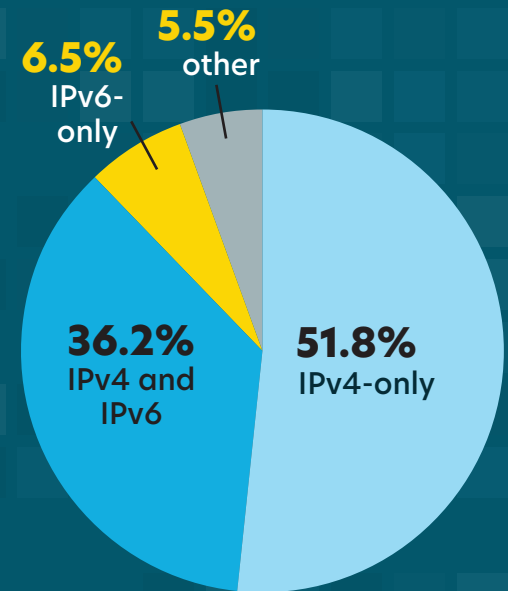

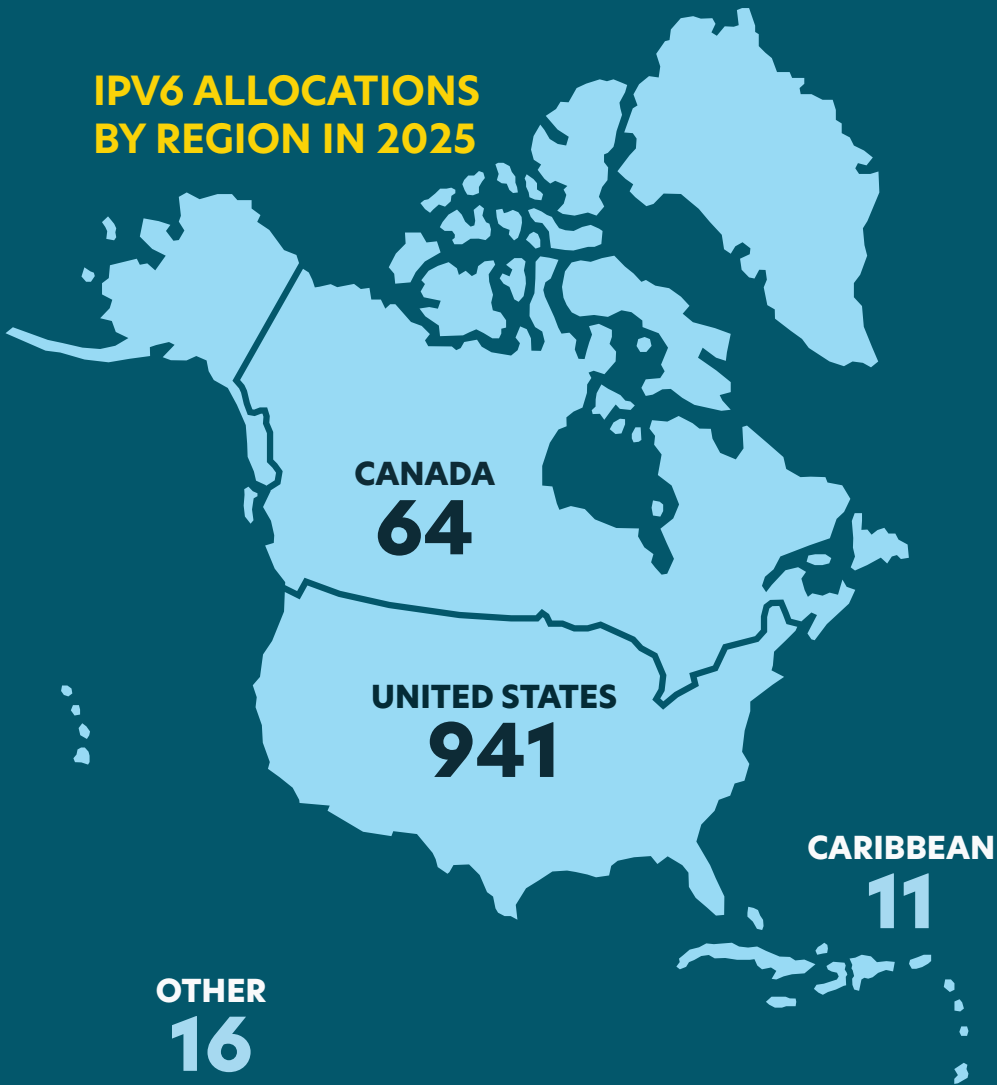

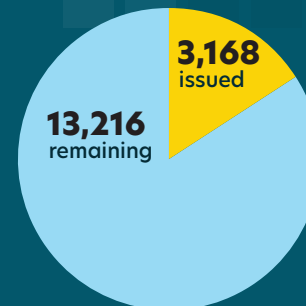

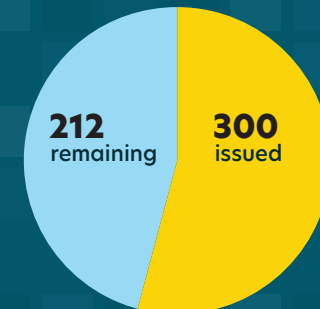

routing security

ARIN encourages members of the Internet community to certify their resources through Resource Public Key Infrastructure (RPKI). Internet routing is vulnerable to hijacking, and the provisioning/use of certificates is one of the first steps required to make routing more secure.

In 2025, ARIN promoted RPKI adoption to our community with our new ARIN Deep Dive program, a hands-on learning opportunity presented by our staff. We also released an interactive online learning module on using Hosted RPKI in ARIN Academy.

ARIN completed various enhancements to our RPKI service, including the addition of Autonomous System Provider Authorization (ASPA) to our Operational Test and Evaluation environment and the release of our Route Origin Authorization (ROA) Change Log in ARIN Online. *All statistics are as of 31 December 2025.*

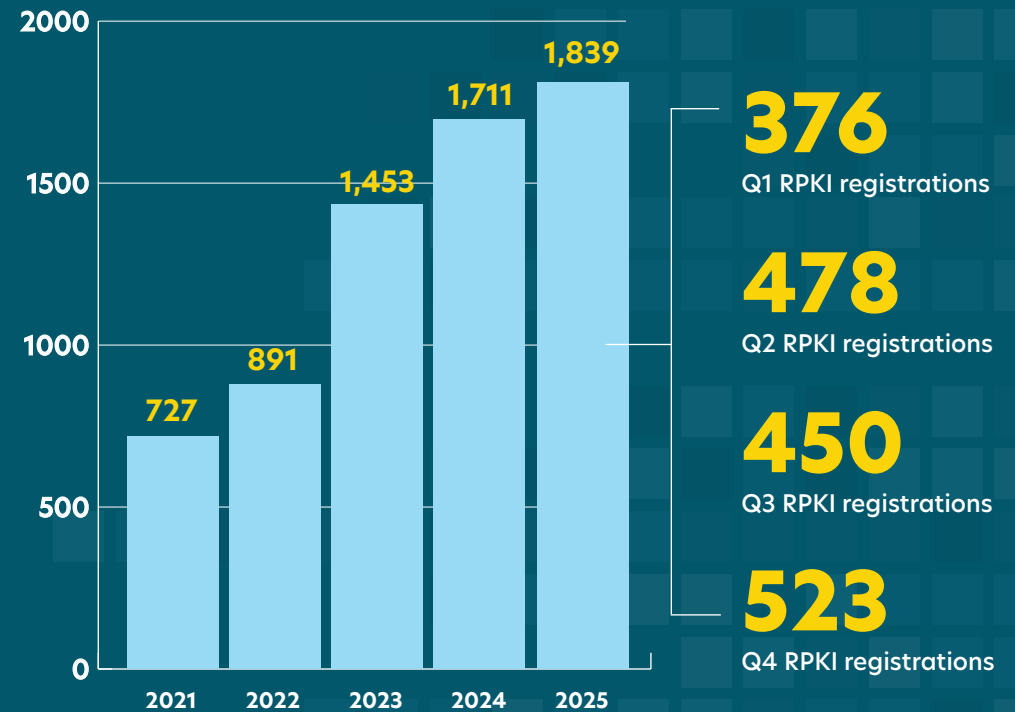

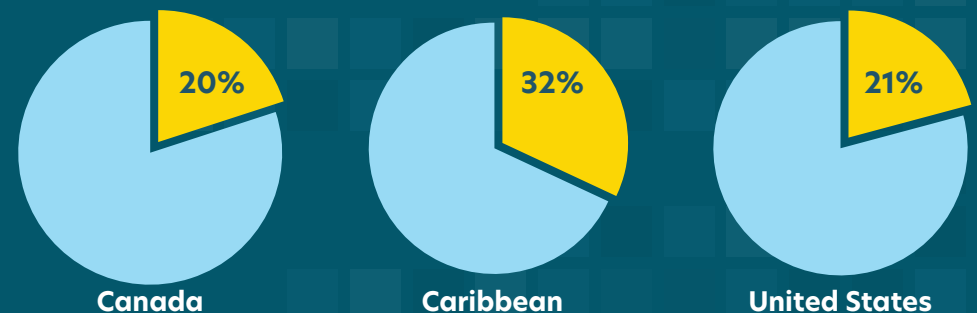

The ARIN Board of Trustees establishes and maintains authority over ARIN's scope, mission, and strategic and fiscal direction. The Board also oversees committee nominations, appointments, and elections, and it votes on community-developed draft policies in accordance with the Policy Development Process (PDP).

In 2025, the Board consisted of 10 members. Nine members were elected by ARIN's General Members, and the President and CEO of ARIN, John Curran, served as the 10th member.

In 2025, the Board held four in-person meetings. The other three meetings were held via teleconference. See *Appendix A for the actions taken by the Board in 2025.*

2025 ELECTION RESULTS

Board of Trustees

government outreach

In 2025, the Government Affairs Department (GAD) continued its efforts to engage with governments and intergovernmental organizations to advocate for the Internet number registry system and the multistakeholder approach to Internet technical coordination. Colleagues relied on the GAD team for their knowledge and support throughout the year while providing an opportunity to keep them apprised of Internet numbering and Regional Internet Registry activities. Some highlights of the year include:

AREAS OF FOCUS

World Telecommunications Development Conference

The GAD team worked on many resolutions with productive outcomes, especially International Telecommunication Union (ITU) Resolution 63 (“Internet Protocol address allocation and facilitating the transition to and deployment of Internet Protocol version 6 in the developing countries”). The team was also delighted to see that the ITU-D SG1 2022-2025 Study Period Final Report, “Strategies and policies for the deployment of broadband in developing countries,” promoted ARIN’s Grant and Fellowship programs.

United Nation’s WSIS+20 Review

The UN continues to recognize academic and technical communities as distinct stakeholders in the multistakeholder process of Internet governance. ARIN is also pleased with the continuation of the Internet Governance Forum and the reaffirmation of the definition of Internet governance as stated in the Tunis Agenda.

ARIN Caribbean Diplomatic Forum

The introduction of this forum in 2025 established a recurring platform to engage Caribbean diplomatic officials on topics such as Internet governance, resilient infrastructure, and regional coordination. Meetings were held in New York City and Washington, D.C.



CONNECTED CARIBBEAN SUMMIT 2025

ARIN continues to play a leading role at the annual Connected Caribbean Summit, helping bring policy, technical, justice, and private-sector leaders together around digital development issues. ARIN co-hosted key sessions including the Caribbean Peering & Interconnection Forum with CaribNOG and the Justice Forum with the Caribbean Agency for Justice Solutions (CAJS). This annual effort continues to advance digital transformation in the Caribbean.

policy development

ARIN ADVISORY COUNCIL

The Advisory Council (AC) serves in an advisory capacity to the Board of Trustees on Internet number resource policy and related matters. Adhering to the procedures in the Policy Development Process (PDP), the AC forwards consensus-based policy proposals to the Board for ratification.

The AC consists of 15 elected members. The President of ARIN is an ex-officio member and acts as the liaison between the Board and the AC.

INFORMATION SECURITY

ARIN recertified compliance with SOC 2 and PCI DSS in October 2025. We undertook several initiatives aimed at strengthening the security of our infrastructure, which included deprecating our FTP service, retiring outdated SSL/TLS communications ciphers, and relocating our data center to a managed facility. We also presented new Annual Security Training, developed entirely in-house, to staff in 2025, and we enhanced several access and risk review processes.



ENGINEERING

ARIN's Engineering team had four releases in 2025, with work focused on Resource Public Key Infrastructure improvements, relocation of one of our data centers, removal of the Origin AS field from ARIN's database, and more. Work continues on internally reducing our technical debt and updating various applications. The team also focused on functionality to allow Internet service providers to aggregate Route Origin Authorizations.



HUMAN RESOURCES & ADMINISTRATION

ARIN is proud to say that our average employee tenure remains strong at nine years. ARIN provides its employees with many benefits, including office events for cross-departmental connections, a robust retirement plan, and charitable opportunities such as a toy drive and school supply drive. ARIN also enhanced management continuity planning with more robust documentation and testing mechanisms.



INCLUSION AND DIVERSITY EFFORTS AT ARIN

ARIN continued its inclusion and diversity efforts in 2025.

We provide an ombudsperson at our Public Policy and Members Meetings to create a safe atmosphere for all members of our community.

We hosted inclusion and management training for staff and volunteers.

We updated our Value Statements with elements of inclusion developed at an in-person employee workshop and added to the "Our People Matter" statement.

Employees and volunteers undergo mandatory harassment prevention training each year.

President and CEO John Curran penned three blog posts on inclusivity, diversity, and equality, which are frequently shared with staff and the Internet community.

FINANCIAL SERVICES

The Financial Services Department prepared 33,200 invoices in 2025, with total billings at US\$31.8 million. The accounts receivable team completed approximately 1,800 service calls to help our customers with billing issues. Financial results continue to be aligned with the Board of Trustees strategy to achieve a balanced budget by 2030.

COMMUNICATIONS

The Communications team plays a key role in helping our customers stay informed of ARIN activities. The team provided significant interdepartmental support for various Member initiatives and programs. ARIN's training platform, ARIN Academy, launched in May, and the team helped launch our new ARIN Deep Dive in-person training workshop in August. We continued to maintain and promote the ARIN website, ARIN Blog, and ARIN social media accounts, adding Instagram to our channel roster in 2025.



CUSTOMER EXPERIENCE & STRATEGY

The Customer Experience & Strategy (CXs) department optimized operational processes and internal and customer-facing systems to modernize service delivery. The Customer Technical Services team provided technical support for Resource Public Key Infrastructure (RPKI) and the Internet Routing Registry (IRR), while Registry Integrity and Oversight strengthened registry compliance and fraud mitigation. CXs also managed ARIN policy development and the Grant and Fellowship programs.

The Number Resource Organization (NRO) is a coordinating body for the five Regional Internet Registries (RIRs): AFRINIC, APNIC, ARIN, LACNIC, and RIPE NCC.

The NRO Number Council (NRO NC) fulfills the role of the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN) Address Supporting Organization Address Council (ASO AC), providing advice to the Board of ICANN on global Internet number resource policy, in conjunction with the RIRs.

Kevin Blumberg, Nick Nugent, and Amy Potter served as NRO NC representatives for the ARIN region in 2025.

ARIN staff worked with the NRO and NRO NC on various initiatives in 2025, including the NRO Resource Public Key Infrastructure (RPKI) Program and global consultations for updating Internet Coordination Policy 2 (ICP-2).

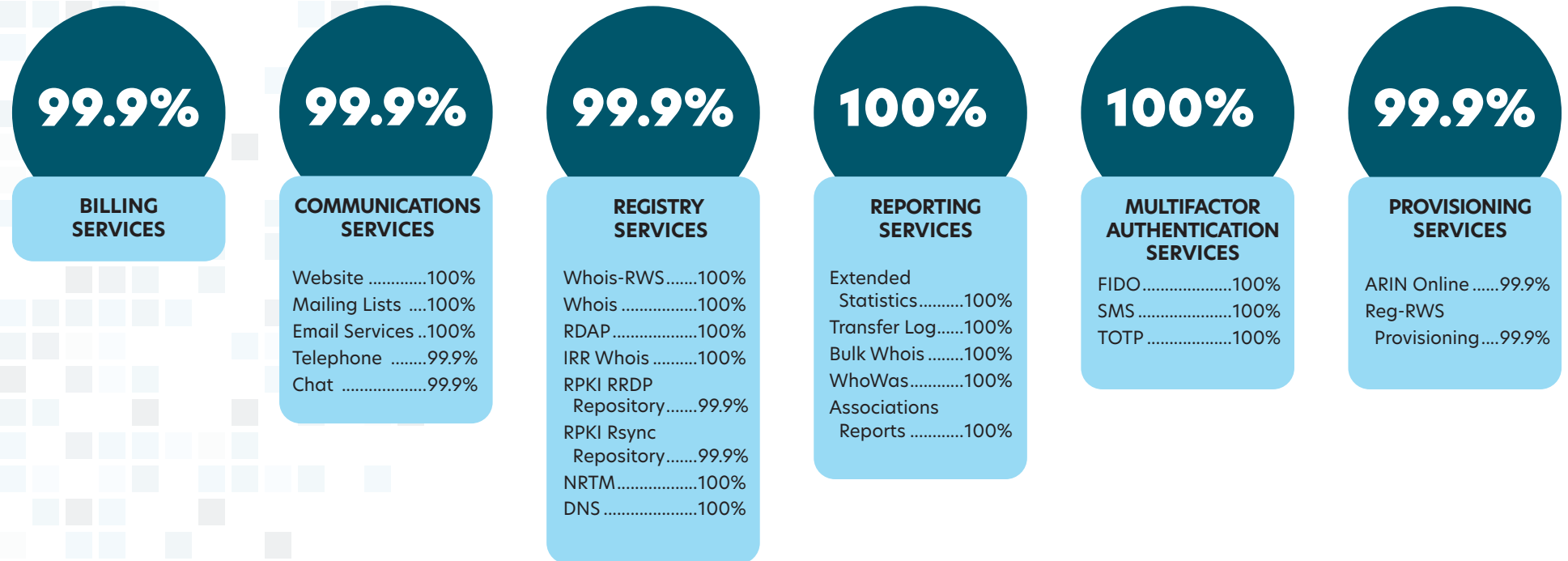
