On Sunday, April 6th, we will be featuring an IPv6 Mini-Workshop from 1:00 PM to 5:00 PM. The Public Policy Meeting, open to members and nonmembers, will take place on Monday, April 7th and Tuesday, April 8th. The Members meeting will take place on Wednesday, April 9th.

Throughout ARIN XI, we will also provide self-paced computer-based training in the ARIN Learning Center. Two training modules will be provided. The first is the "Understanding ARIN's Database and Templates" training offered at our past meeting and available on our website. This training is suitable for someone either new to ARIN or seeking a better understanding of these

issues since our database conversion last August.

The second training module is new and is called "Querying ARIN's WHOIS." Made up of a series of units, this training provides an overview of ARIN's WHOIS, an



Internet Community Meeting Reports

RIPE 44 January 27-31, 2003 Amsterdam, NL

RIPE 44 covered a wide variety of issues including IPv6 policy and the results of the RIPE membership survey. A tutorial session on IP Requests was given on Monday, January 27.

Ray Plzak, President and CEO of ARIN, presented information about ARIN, including organizational news and an announcement about the upcoming ARIN XI meeting.

RIPE staff gave a presentation on an improved Secure Communication System for RIPE members. Highlights from the RIPE NCC working groups include reports on anti-spam efforts, DNS, IPv6 and an update on the RIPE NCC LIR Portal.

NANOG 27 February 9-11, 2003 Phoenix, Arizona, US

The North American Network Operators' Group (NANOG) held its 27th meeting February 9-11, 2003, in Phoenix, Arizona. NANOG conferences provide a forum for the coordination and dissemination of technical information related to large-scale (i.e., national/international) Internet backbone networking technologies and operational practices.

Tutorial sessions began on Sunday afternoon, February 9 and included BGP Techniques for Service Providers, A Methodology for Troubleshooting Interdomain IP Multicast, and IPv6 Deployment Concepts. The General Session began on Monday, February 10 and ended on Tuesday, February 11 and covered a variety of technical topics including The Spread of the Sapphire/Slammer Worm, Peering Evolution, an Internet Exchange Operator Panel, Large Scale Wireless Networks, UT's Case, and BGP4 Anycast for Root Name Service -- Threat or Menace?, to name just a few.

APNIC 15/ APRICOT 2003 February 24 -28, 2003 Taipei, TW

APNIC 15 was held in Taipei in conjunction with APRICOT 2003. It included APNIC training, tutorials, Special Interest Groups (SIGs), Hostmaster consultations, the APNIC Member Meeting, and a social event.

The APNIC Annual Member Meeting, held on February 28, was well attended with 116 delegates present and 37 APNIC members represented. Representatives from the other RIRs (ARIN, LACNIC, and RIPE NCC) and ICANN were also present. A total of 558 delegates from 30 economies attended APRICOT 2003.

A variety of policy and operational issues were discussed including a discussion of the policy development process in the APNIC region, a potential revision to the existing IPv6 policy, as well as discussion about the management of the IPv6 address space (sparse allocation), database clean up, and lame delegation clean up.

In addition, an open election to fill four vacant positions on the APNIC Executive Council took place at the APNIC Annual Member Meeting on Friday, February 28, 2003.

IETF 56 March 17-21, 2003 San Francisco, California, US

The process of reforming the IETF continued to be one of the themes of the meeting. The main topics at the Internet Engineering Steering Group plenary included intellectual property rules regarding IETF documents, documentation of the roles and responsibilities of the IESG, and the looming financial crisis of the IETF. The most significant technical news is that SNMPv3 has progressed to Full Standard, a level few efforts have ever reached.

ARIN staff attended meetings related to IPv6, Routing, DNS, Registry operations, and the Internet Engineering Performance Group. In the IEPG, ARIN presented on work to date reducing DNS lame delegations. Reducing lameness in the DNS was also featured in other presentations, illustrating that ARIN is not alone in this concern. In other developments, IPv6 developers are considering the deprecation of site local addresses, and the 6bone experimenters will request a delegation of their reverse DNS entries from IANA. The IETF is considering a group called GROW that will study many of the same routing issues of ARIN's RTMA effort.

ICANN March 23-27, 2003 Rio de Janeiro, BR

The International Corporation for Assigned Names and Numbers (ICANN) held a meeting at the Sofitel Hotel in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The highlight of the meeting was the transfer of the Presidency from M. Stuart Lynn to Paul Twomey. The Board also adopted several resolutions pertaining to names issues and approved the meeting schedule for 2004. The RIRs had a meeting with the Government Advisory Committee and made a presentation to them. The RIRs also released a communique to the GAC. Details of this can be found at:

- Approved AC's recommendation to abandon Policy Proposal 2002-7.
- -Confirmed AC's appointment of two interim AC members: Dana Argiro and Andrew Dul.
- Approved Privacy Statement for website

The ARIN Advisory Council met on January 16, 2003 via teleconference. Alec Peterson was reelected as Chairman of the AC.

Topics discussed included ongoing policy proposals, IPv6 policy, the possibilty of a RWhois server policy, and issues raised by the allocation of blocks out of the 69/8 space.

In the last three months, the AC has had three resignations. Barbara Roseman resigned in January and Dana Argiro was appointed to fill this seat until December 31, 2003. Tanya Hinman resigned in February, and Andrew Dul was appointed to fill this seat until the end of 2003. In March, Dawn Martin resigned and an interim appointment is pending.

the structuring of a query to retrieve information and understanding output.

Self-contained units serve a broad target audience. Novice users of ARIN's WHOIS will benefit from completing the entire program in sequential order. Advanced users of ARIN's WHOIS who wish to hone specific query skills may select specific modules.

Understanding ARIN's Database and Templates

The focus of the training is to describe the features of ARIN's database and the areas of authority involved with using our templates. The training also covers, in detail, the Org and POC templates as well as the 5 SWIP-replacement templates (Reassign-Simple, Reassign-Detailed, Reallocation, Net-Mod, and Net-Name-Change).

This CBT was first delivered at a Learning Center in October 2002 at ARIN X in Eugene, Oregon. For those that missed earlier training opportunities, or who have additional questions, this is a great chance to learn how to interact with ARIN's database and learn how to utilize our templates. It is designed to be helpful to a broad audience and to allow you to learn at your own pace. This training module is also available for use on our website at:



Attractions in Memphis



The Birthplace of Rock and Roll is a cultural melting pot of the South. Memphis is the nation's 18th largest city, both in area and population, and boasts a population of over 650,000. With the Mississippi running along the western side of town, Memphis offers enough blues and barbecue for the 8 million visitors that come to Memphis each year.

Whether it's Beale Street or Graceland, the city is proud of it's musical heritage. The Smithsonian has captured the history of music in Memphis at the Rock N' Soul Museum. Fans of art and history will appreciate the Memphis Pink Palace Museum, whether they visit the Planetarium or take in an IMAX show. The Peabody Place Museum & Gallery features collections of Chinese art, while the Art Museum of University of Memphis features Egyptian and African art. Or how about a riverboat cruise? The Memphis Queen features daily cruises down the Mighty Mississippi.

While Memphis features dozens of great barbecue restaurants, great renditions of Italian, classic French, Russian, and Asian cuisine can also be found. Explore the list of fine restaurants and other attractions at:

If you're trying to figure out what to pack, you can expect average temperatures between 52° and 72° F during the April meeting. Additionally, a little bit of rain will usually be in the forecast during April.

"The Home of Blues" has more than just Blues and Barbecue. Whether it's wineries or a trolley ride downtown, Memphis is a cultural melting pot to be explored.

The Peabody Memphis

The Peabody Hotel features the world-famous parade of ducks daily at 11 AM and 5 PM. The hotel is located just two blocks from the Beale Street Historic District with blues music clubs lining the street.

The ducks have been associated with the hotel since the 1930s, when the hotel's general manager and a friend decided it would be funny to have some ducks in the hotel lobby's fountain. Having just returned from a duck hunting trip, they happened to have some live duck decoys, which were English call ducks, on them.


Now, over 75 years later, ducks are still there. The hotel uses mallards now, which are raised by a local farmer. They live in the fountain until they are full grown. According to the hotel, once full grown, they reside in the "Royal Duck Palace" on the hotel's roof. When they retire, they are returned to the wild. No word on whether the ducks were ever asked if they wanted to give up living in the hotel, their cushy digs, or room service.

The hotel isn't all about ducks however. The Peabody Memphis features fine restaurants, such as Chez Phillipe, which focuses on making traditional French cooking blended with Southern ingredients.


For a touch of Northern Italy, you can also eat at the Capriccio Restaurant, Bar and Grill. This restaurant, which opened in 2002, features an exhibition kitchen, a wood-burning pizza oven, and a seasonal menu.

Finally, there is also the Lobby Bar, named one of the best in the country by *Bon Appetit* magazine. Designed to focus on the famous lobby sculpted Travertine marble fountain, this is an enjoyable spot to relax.
